Course: HIST 109 World History II

Department: History/Government

Description: This course is a study of modern world history from approximately 1450 to the present, with a focus on the non-western world before European expansion, the ecological impact of globalization, the development of modern states and nations in Asia, Africa, the Near and Middle East and the Americas, economic and cultural contact and exchange between civilizations in the modern era. Special attention is given to the cultural, political and economic interrelationship of these regions; local, regional, and global conflicts; imperialism and the struggle for independence; and global political systems.

Prerequisites: ENGL 092 Preparing for College Reading II and ENGL 099 Introductory Writing; waiver by placement testing results; or departmental approval.
