### FROM THE EDITOR BY CORINNE M. MASON

# CONTEMPORARY MYTHOLOGY



Why do you think the Eurydice myth still resonates today?

SABRINA: Most Greek myths have relevance to our current reality, but Eurydice in particular because it still shows the trials and tribulations of love and loss. It also makes a strong point about grief, because when you are grieving you want that back. You keep searching for some sort of sign or answer that can give you peace. But sometimes you realize that there may not be an answer and you still have to keep moving forward even if the ones you love have left you behind.

MAGGIE: It is a strong example of the human condition and things like grief, pain, suffering, and love are emotions that people still experience. Stories from the past, factual or fictional can still resonate with us because those feelings are universal.

MIKAYLA: We all go through our own experiences of love and loss. Because we all go through these experiences this piece can teach us something about ourselves in relation to that. We are constantly changing, as is how we cope with love and loss, so this myth can resonate with people depending on what point in their life in which they are experiencing it.

#### ABOUT THE SHOW

In Eurydice, Sarah Ruhl reimagines the classic myth of Orpheus through the eyes of its heroine. Dying too young on her wedding day, Eurydice must journey to the underworld, where she reunites with her father and struggles to remember her lost love. #### CONVERSATION CONT:

This particular piece was set in a more contemporary style, and explored newer theatrical methodologies in the storytelling, what was the experience like for you creating this piece?

SABRINA: It was definitely different than any other production I have done. It was interesting to work through the development of a show around this myth, but with a feminist and contemporary take. Seeing it from Eurydice's perspective changed the energy of the story and I favored it over the original myth. Overall, finding creativity in making the exciting and joyful moments, teaches us that you don't know what you have until you lose it. It is something that we as performers had to come to terms with and the characters do too.

MAGGIE: I think that working through a production of a play with a more contemporary vision requires more creativity than a classical piece does. We added several movement pieces and had a more lyrical approach to the transitions. It asked us to collaborate in a new way. It was refreshing and educational to be able to have a strong hand in building several moments of the show. We built this from the ground up and it felt like a forward thinking version of the story.

MIKAYLA: For me the biggest thing I love about doing devised work is finding the little moments that you build off of to create something that means a lot more. It forces you to be freer in your artistry because when you create from scratch there is less space to judge what you are creating,

#### Can you tell us a little bit about the opening event?

#### What has been your favorite part of the new studio?

T: My favorite part of the new studio definitely has to be the newscast desk. It's pretty fun to be behind that. I did that for a few weeks in the morning, I would help them out with a script they would write and then we would start filming. It's pretty sweet. I really like how the chairs are very nicely oriented and the mics are really crisp.

#### What advice would you give to students looking to get involved?

T: I would definitely do Media Axis. It's something simple that you can come too so you can just express whatever creative needs you want to. Since Massasoit is a community college, it can be a great way to get your foot in the door while saving some money.





### What opportunities are presented by the new facilities?

E: The new facilities offer the opportunity for students to work in and learn in a studio space, that's very much like what they'll find in the real world. In a production studio environment, like a cable station or a television station, the tools that we use are standard across the industry now. The kinds of things that they learn would help them in almost any job in what we call, multimedia content creation. Whether it's television or content creation for TikTok, YouTube, or something along those lines, the tools and the message that we teach are universal for content creation.

### How can people be more involved in the program?

E: It's hard for us to reach out to students so if students come by the studio on a regular basis, talk to our staff, and find out what's happening. We have sign-up sheets right by the back of the studio door, so you can check and see what events are coming up, what shoots we have, and sign up for things! Anybody can work on our shoots. We'll train anyone, they don't have to be in our classes or in our club. Our students that are in our classes and clubs get to have practical experience in an academic setting.

### What advice would you give to people interested in the program?

E: Come have a tour of the studio, talk to our staff, get to know what we offer and take advantage of everything we offer! We're at this amazing hands-on program that people don't know about and you can save a ton of money by coming here for going onto a more expensive school if that's your career goal.

### How do you stay involved with the program?

K: I would say maybe the practicing of doing class plays and plays before we would able to go on the stage. I just felt like that was something that was therapeutic



#### Have you done any artistic work outside of Massasoit?

L: Yes I I've done a lot of training in Meisner and Chekov in Boston, and play writing. I've done a lot of writing and for me education is just reading and seeing other things that are out there.

K: I did a few shows here and there, in a couple of places. I did a couple of artistic works in the music industry and also have worked on short films.

#### What has been your greatest challenge?

L: Confidence, not comparing myself to people, and looking at my journey, as not being linear. Looking at my art, I did like to judge my success, seeing where I started from in the beginning, and looking at myself as a canvas of improvement. Now I'm working with a speech pathologist to work on some things that I was insecure about and that I needed work on, so instead of me, comparing myself to people, I compare myself to my myself.

K: I would think my greatest challenge was to really see the signs within me instead of seeing the signs that are in others. Just the principles of, you know, that type of thing that people expect you to be. I I felt like I had to have confidence in order to really become who I needed to as an artist and become who I am today. That challenge was just really finding inner self. I feel like I'm still trying to find myself as we are talking right now. I feel like that's just always the challenge.


#### What makes the arts at Massasoit Community College unique?

K: Life starts within the signs of you and make sure that everything you think of, and what you thought of, think about it again and try again.
