<u>Course Description</u>: *MLFR101-01 H01 Beginning French 1 3 CREDITS* This course initiates the development of the ability to speak, understand, read and write French. Students learn the fundamentals of grammar, basic vocabulary, and correct pronunciation. Various aspects of French cultures are discussed. <u>This is a beginning level</u> <u>course for students with no previous experience or with no more than one year of</u> <u>study in French at the high school level.</u>



Course Objectives:

Students will be able to understand, speak and write basic French phrases, sentences, and messages and engage in simple dialogues.

Students will engage with authentic Francophone cultural materials (films, websites, music, journals, etc.)


Students will be able to read and comprehend basic French materials.

Students will be aware of some differences between several Francophone cultures.

Teaching Procedures: Your instructor selects and assigns materials from your online textbook. In class, we will review, correct and practice your work, which includes grammar activities, pronunciation, vocabulary, and cultural readings and lectures. Additionally, you will be assigned supplementary materials, including Canvas Discussions, videos and research, to reinforce your grammar and conversational skills as well as cultural knowledge and understanding. Your professor will manually grade your assignments and offer suggestions on how to improve your pronunciation and fluency. You will find corrections and comments on your Canvas submissions.

<u>Anticipated Outcomes</u>: By the end of the semester, students should be able to read, write and communicate in basic French, including idiomatic expressions. Students should also acquire a basic comprehension of Francophone cultures and communities.

Examen: At the end of each chapter, you will have a cumulative exam featuring oral, listening, writing and grammar comprehension questions. We will, of course, review before each exam. You can expect three to four pages per exam.

<u>Quizzes</u>: Throughout each chapter, you will have brief in-class quizzes. They will cover vocabulary, grammar and cultural readings. These quizzes will happen at the END of class period to avoid complications with late arrivals. **Your two lowest quiz scores will be dropped**.

Exams Orals: Twice during the semester, students will engage with their professor for an oral interview. You will be provided with a series of basic questions ahead of time that include vocabulary and grammar. Please prepare your answers ahead of time so that your interview will run smoothly. We will arrange for individual oral exams (one-on-one between you and me) during regularly scheduled class times. More to follow.

<u>Class Participation & Homework:</u> You are expected to prepare all assignments. I will usually announce when I intend on collecting exercises and will periodically check your work throughout the semester. I will do this at least once a week. Your three lowest homework assignments, including failure to complete work will be dropped. You are expected to participate vigorously and respectfully in class. Participation means having your homework completed and out, your materials (e-book, photocopies, notebook) at the ready and answers prepared. Participation does not include staring at your phone or out the window,

Attendance: You are expected to be in class with materials out and ready. You may miss two course meetings without having your grade penalized. Every additional missed class will result in a lowering of your attendance score. If you miss class, please consult CANVAS or a classmate to catch up on what you missed. I will not respond to emails inquiring about this information.

<u>Announcements</u>: I will be using the Announcements section of Canvas to remind you of upcoming quizzes, oral interviews and composition due dates, as well as to inform you of any upcoming relevant cultural activities in Southern New England.
