Beginning Spanish 1



¡Bienvenidos! Welcome to Beginning Spanish 1. What follows is basic information about the course. Please read it thoroughly, and if you have any questions do not hesitate to ask.

This course initiates the development of the ability to speak, understand, read, and write Spanish. Students learn the fundamentals of grammar, basic vocabulary, and correct pronunciation. Various aspects of Spanish cultures will be discussed. This is a beginning level course designed for students with no previous experience or with no more than one year of study in Spanish at the high school level. Please reach out to me or someone from the Modern Language department if you have questions about placement.

Required text:

For this course you will be required to purchase McGraw-Hill Education <u>Connect® access</u> for Experience Spanish 3e

You can purchase the book + Connect access code OR you can also purchase one-semester access of Connect as part of the login process. Connect includes an ebook, and you will have what you need for the semester.

Objectives of the course

The goals of Spanish 1 are various. The first is to develop **basic communicative skills** in Spanish as a second language. These include but are not limited to the following sample abilities:

- greet and respond to others
- express your likes and dislikes

- share information about pastimes that you enjoy
- describe and ask others about their families

A second goal is to develop **some general knowledge about cultural differences** between the U.S. and the Spanish-speaking world. Some examples are:

- geography and ethnic groups of Spanish-speaking world
- holidays in the Spanish-speaking world
- family structures of Spanish-speaking cultures
- leisure and social activities in the Spanish-speaking world

To succeed: Participate actively and ask questions! Daily practice is crucial to language learning: plan at least 1.5 to 2 hours study at home for each credit hour. It is your responsibility to seek clarification and contact me if you have any questions. NOTE: It will take a minimum of 24 hours to respond to questions and emails, so please don't leave your work for the last minute.

Tutoring: Free tutoring in Spanish is available in the World Language Center, part of the Academic Resource Center (ARC), located in the lower level of the Student Center, under the library. **I am also available for extra help.**
