




Enrollment & Student Demographics




Student Retention and Status








Affordability & Financial Aid

As an open-enrollment institution of higher education, Massasoit is committed to providing access to a relevant, affordable education that positions and supports students from all socioeconomic backgrounds to achieve their academic and professional goals.

Massasoit participates in a number of federal and state financial aid programs to assist students in financing the costs of their education.

We are proud that Massasoit is ranked as the lowest-cost college, among other community colleges in Massachusetts.

Free College

Many students won't have to pay anything to attend Massasoit, because they are receiving financial support from MassEducate and MassReconnect, state programs helping all Massachusetts residents who have not yet earned a bachelor's degree to attend community college for free. Eligible students have their tuition, fees, books, and supplies covered by the state in the form of last dollar financial aid grant awards after all other financial aid and grants are applied. Nearly 1,300 students received funding from these programs - without this help, many would have delayed college or had to take out student loans.

"Having access to Free College has been life-changing for me," said Nahomie Morency, a criminal justice student at Massasoit. "Because of this program, I have found support not only through my education, but with my fellow students on the Women's Volleyball Team. I am able to further my education, and I found a community that cares for me as much as I care for them."

In 2024-2025 at Massasoit, \$4,850,789 in Free College funds were awarded to eligible students.

Financial Aid

Massachusetts' Free College programs require interested students to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or the Massachusetts Application for State Financial Aid (MASFA) if they do not qualify to complete the FAFSA.


Additionally, the College has shifted its culture from "collections" to "access." We have increased resources to assist students to access funds through new hires and outreach initiatives that better allow us to support students through the financial aid process.

Together, this has resulted in an increase of the number of students who can now receive aid - and in turn reduce the number of those taking out student loans.




Pell Grant Recipients





Green Key Awards

Liana Fontes, a first-generation college student majoring in liberal arts transfer, served as a peer leader in the TRIO Student Support Services program and President of the Cape Verdean Student Alliance on campus, using both roles to positively impact the Massasoit community. Liana plans to continue on her educational path by earning her bachelor's degree at UMass Boston.

Early College Access at Massasoit

Through partnerships with area high schools, Blue Hills Regional Technical High School, Bristol-Plymouth Regional Technical School, Brockton High School, Middleborough High School, Norfolk County Agricultural School, Southeastern Regional Vocational Technical High School, and New Heights Charter School of Brockton, the Office of Early College Access at Massasoit provides access to, and preparation for, higher education. Students are offered a variety of opportunities to take classes for college credit that include the Commonwealth Dual Enrollment Program, Massasoit Dual Enrollment Program, and Gateway to College program. Early College Access has proven its success through a pass rate that exceeds that for all credit students.

Commonwealth Honors Program

Each year, Massasoit's Commonwealth Honors Program students present a visual display of their semester-long research to the College and the public at the Spring Honors Conference.

Students in the Spring 2025 semester's Honors Seminar chose to research topics relating to societal issues and moral dilemmas. **Mia Berger**, business administration transfer, chose to focus her project on DNA testing.



Phi Theta Kappa

Phi Theta Kappa is the international honor society for two-year college students, and has recognized and encouraged scholarship among community college students for 100 years while promoting the academic integrity of the associate degree program.

Amber Medeiros, former Massasoit student and Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) chapter and regional officer, received the 2025 Alumni Hall of Honor Award. Amber was the only nominee from the New England Region of PTK to be selected to receive this honor.





Last summer, high school rising junior, **Neil Dutta**, a dual-enrollment student at Massasoit, was selected for the 2024 Coca-Cola Leaders of Promise Scholarship through PTK. He was also recognized for his academic excellence and leadership as one of three Massasoit students named to this year's PTK All-Massachusetts Academic Team.

STEM Program & Native Pollinator Monitoring Program

The STEM Program has provided research opportunities to more than 175 students for 12 years thanks to the STEM Starter Academy funding. Concurrently, the Native Pollinator Monitoring Program is entering its 10th year and has contributed data on over 20,000 bees to our native pollinator database. This year, three interns had their scientific poster abstracts accepted for presentation at the Ecological Society of America's annual conference in Baltimore, Maryland—bringing the total number of presentations at national conferences to 38. To date, 16 students who have participated in this program have pursued graduate studies after their time at Massasoit: four are currently enrolled in master's programs and seven are pursuing doctorates.

2025 Presidential Scholar

Faith Amado graduated this past May alongside fellow members of the Class of 2025 with a degree in biology. Her time at Massasoit gave her a strong foundation in the sciences and she plans to continue her education at a four-year institution and move forward on the path to medical school.



Veteran Services at Massasoit

For the past three years, Massasoit Community College has earned the silver designation as a military friendly school in the Military Friendly® Schools' list in recognition of the support our Veterans Center provides to all military members, veterans, and their families. Massasoit's Veterans Center also sponsors the Veterans Giving Tree during the holidays, collecting and sending holiday gifts to veterans in the Brockton VA Hospital, and supports the Veteran & Service Member Club, which volunteers in the community and fundraises for veteran causes, including Run to Home Base.



TRIO Programs at Massasoit

TRIO Student Support Services (TRIO SSS) is a federally funded program focused on increasing the retention, graduation, and transfer rates from two-year to four-year institutions of students who are first-generation, low income and/or have a documented disability.

TRIO Talent Search (TRIO TS) is a federally funded student support program designed to encourage Brockton High School students (Grades 9-12) to graduate from high school and enroll in programs of postsecondary education.

Our TRIO Programs at Massasoit currently serve 707 students (170 in SSS, 537 in TS).




TRIO Student Spotlight: Lenni Vargas

After graduating from Massasoit, Lenni plans to transfer to a four-year university to earn a degree in forensic psychology.



Massasoit Offers Career Readiness for Students and the Community

Massasoit Community College Offices of Career Services and Veteran Services, in partnership with MassHire Greater Brockton Career Center, hosted a Career Fair on April 16, open to students and the community. The Career Fair was held in the Julie Mulvey Gymnasium in the Peter Asiaf Field House, with the first half hour of the event dedicated exclusively to veterans, offering them a unique opportunity to connect with employers. More than 80 employers participated, representing diverse sectors and industries. Also included was a space for resume writing, professional headshots for Massasoit students, and tables with information on admissions and financial aid for members of the public interested in starting or restarting their college journey.



Massasoit's New Police Station

Opening in time for the Fall 2025 semester, the Massasoit Community College Police Department's new station will provide a revamped space for department staff. Located in the lower-level of the Student Center in Brockton, the new space will allow for a more suitable and transparent public safety area that serves to be more welcoming to the campus community while providing much needed operational space to meet the standards of modern-day campus law enforcement.





Supporting Our Students

Addressing Basic Needs

Massasoit supports its thousands of students through a range of initiatives, including academic advising, career and transfer support, tutoring, access and disability accommodations, and more. But many students need help with the basic needs of life - including social and financial resources and physical and behavioral health.

Partnerships with organizations like BAMSI and Father Bill's & MainSpring provide students access to vital resources to help them overcome barriers to their success.

The Pantry

The College's most visible and well-known support program is The Pantry, located in the Brockton Campus Student Center. This food pantry - supported by grants and partnerships - provides meals and snacks to students and community members.

Send Silence Packing

On March 10, Massasoit partnered with ActiveMinds to bring to the Brockton Campus the Send Silence Packing mobile exhibit to end the silence on mental health and suicide. The all-day exhibit featured personal stories from individuals who have lost a loved one to suicide - each attached to a backpack. Massasoit was honored to donate two backpacks with stories from a Massasoit student and a staff member to the exhibit. The event was attended by hundreds of students and community members and was featured on WCVB Channel 5.



Warrior Athletics

Massasoit is Warrior country! The Warrior Athletics program is one of the most recognized National Junior College Athletics Association programs in New England.

Athletes practice and host contests at the College's Peter G. Asiaf Field House - which includes an Olympic-sized swimming pool, the Julie Mulvey Gymnasium, athletic training facilities, and an athlete lounge - and its adjacent Warrior Soccer Field, Louis R. Colombo Baseball Field, Coach Thomas Frizzell Baseball Complex, and a softball field.

Over the course of the 2024-2025 academic year, the College has invested in its facilities and athletes, renovating spaces and purchasing new equipment for its cardio and weight training rooms and refinishing the floor of the Mulvey Gymnasium.

Campuses & Communities

Brockton Campus

Massasoit's main location is its 100-acre, 10-building campus in Brockton. Opened in 1972 and completed in 1978, the majority of the College's students are served here. The Anna P. Buckley Performing Arts Center, the Peter G. Asiaf Field House, and the Student Center contain a number of student and community spaces. Additional features include athletic playing fields, TV and radio studios, a dining hall, and many offices for student support services.





Canton Campus

Massasoit's Canton campus is located in the shadow of the idyllic Blue Hills. The campus is the primary home to many of the College's career, technical, and visual arts programs, including veterinary technology, dental assisting, and diesel technology. The campus also includes its own library, advising center, enrollment center, café, and the Akillian Gallery used for College and community events and art exhibitions.

Middleborough Center

Massasoit's Middleborough Center is in the heart of downtown and provides students in the southern part of the College's service area and the SouthCoast, convenient access to classes and services. As of 2025, eight of the College's credit and Community Education programs can be completed fully in Middleborough with a combination of online classes. Advising, student services, and events are available at the Center as well.






Massasoit Future of Work Institute


Service Area

After Graduation

After graduating, our students continue to build lives and families in Greater Brockton and across the South Shore - helping fuel our local economy. Post-graduation earnings data from the U.S. Census Bureau's Post-Secondary Employment Outcomes tool highlights the economic value of a Massasoit education. Five years after completing an associate degree, alumni earn:

- »\$76,664 in Health Professions and Related Programs
- »\$69,898 in Mechanic and Repair Technologies
- » \$64,760 in Computer and Information Sciences and Support Services
- » \$54,208 in Business, Management and Related Services
- »\$55,431 across all instructional programs

Planning Our Future

2024-2029 Strategic Plan

During the 2023-2024 academic year, Massasoit began developing its Strategic Plan with input from across the College. It was accepted by the Massachusetts Board of Higher Education in the Summer of 2024.

Progress Points

- » The College announced and launched the Massasoit Community College Future of Work Institute.
- » The Liberal Arts Building was vacated to begin work on the Transformation Through Renovation project and become the new Science Building.
- » The College initiated a project to launch a new website content management system to improve access and user experience with a focus on enrollment.
- » The College realigned divisions in Academic Affairs from six to five divisions that united related programs.
- » The College received a report from AACRAO (American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers) that details the enrollment process to help the College streamline and improve the enrollment experience.
- » The College's Human Resources team developed and presented a revised new-employee onboarding process.



NECHE

Massasoit Community College is accredited by the New England Commission of Higher Education. The College's NECHE accreditation indicates that it meets or exceeds criteria for the assessment of institutional quality periodically applied through a peer review process.

Accreditation provides reasonable assurance about the quality of opportunities available to students who attend Massasoit, and it is a requirement for students to qualify for federal and state financial aid.

Every 10 years, Massasoit is required to publish a self-study: a report indicating how the College is living up to its mission against a series of standards. Developing the report is a multi-year, college-wide process that brings together varied voices and input from faculty and staff.

During the 2024-2025 academic year, the College kicked off the portion of the project that included forming committees, reviewing standards, defining research questions, and beginning to collect verifiable evidence. Eight different committees participated in fact-finding and helped host College discussions based on their research questions. By May of 2025, committees submitted their outlines and evidence - just in time for writing to begin!

Transformation Through Renovation

Massasoit's Transformation Through Renovation Project (TTR) is a \$52 million capital project that will bring state-of-the-art classrooms and labs to the College's Brockton Campus. The multi-year project, which began in July 2022, includes the gut-rehab of two instructional buildings to create a new Science Building and a new Health Science Building. The new spaces - designed with input from students, faculty, and staff - will impact thousands of students across nearly all of Massasoit's academic divisions, and will enhance how the College trains our community's future professionals.

Project Scope

The TTR Project is the first major renovation of academic buildings at Massasoit since 1978 – when the second phase of the campus was completed. The current Science Building was built in 1972 and the Humanities "H" Building (that houses the College's Nursing and Respiratory Technology programs) was built in 1978.

The new buildings will each feature state-of-the-art laboratories, classrooms, offices, and student spaces that have been designed to meet the needs of 21st-century college students. Students will receive their education in a facility outfitted with the latest technology providing them with vital background and experience as they pursue careers in Massachusetts' leading biotech and healthcare industries.

The new Science Building, which will boast a new greenhouse, will include a lab that will house the College's STEM program, and the new Health Science Building will include capabilities to run complex simulations that will not only train students, but can be utilized by area healthcare providers for workforce development.

The renovations will include much-needed updates to meet current technology, accessibility, energy, and life safety standards. The project will free up deferred maintenance funding to be allocated to other buildings that will in turn create parity across the Brockton Campus. Inclusive design principles were key throughout the planning process to ensure that the Massasoit community was engaged in creating spaces designed to promote belonging and wellbeing.

Continuing Education

Continuing Education at Massasoit extends the College's services through a variety of non-credit career training and certifications, professional development, online, and personal enrichment courses and programs that are designed to meet the needs of local industries and a broad population of students, including English language learners.

Adult Basic Education

The Adult Basic Education Program (ABE) at Massasoit offers adult learners English as a Second Language (ESOL) classes and the Transition to Community College Program that gives adult learners the opportunity to gain the necessary academic skills to enter a credit program at Massasoit.

Community Education

The Community Education department at Massasoit serves a broad population of students, some of whom are developing skills to take their career to the next level, those who are training for a new career, and others who simply want to learn something new for their own personal interest. Programs include courses in Health Science, ESOL, and license renewals. Some courses are free to underemployed and unemployed students in our Education and Training Fund initiative.

Continuing Education Partnerships

Massachusetts provides a training grant program for small businesses to help address business productivity with their current and newly hired employees. In 2024-2025, Massasoit was successful in partnering with South Shore Bank and 88 Acres Foods, a plant-based food manufacturing company in Canton for courses in workplace ESOL, new manager, data analytics and senior leadership skills.

Other ongoing training partnerships were implemented with Braintree School District's Launch Program in customer service and workforce readiness, Old Colony YMCA for ESOL, and the Norfolk County Sheriff's Office for training incarcerated students about OSHA.

Future of Work Institute

The Massasoit Community College Future of Work Institute (FWI) was launched to create and strengthen collaborative partnerships that enhance workforce development and economic growth initiatives for businesses and industries in the South Shore region.

The FWI's inaugural Memorandum of Understanding was signed between the College and the Massachusetts Probation Service (MPS) to train and upskill MPS employees, and to provide education and career development opportunities to support the successful reentry of formerly incarcerated or justice-involved individuals into the community.

Correctional Education and Returning Citizens (CERC)

Massasoit is one of two community colleges providing Prison Education Programs (PEP) with the Massachusetts Department of Corrections (DOC) and the first with a program approved by the U.S. Department of Education to award Pell funding to eligible students.

As a PEP, incarcerated students at Old Colony Correctional Center and DOC-Milford have the opportunity to earn a college credential which will prepare them to enter the workforce upon their release.




College Budget

Massasoit uses a zero-based budgeting model. Beginning in the spring semester, fund managers throughout the College develop budgets based on their projected needs for the following fiscal year. Once submitted, the College's finance team works to build the College's budget against its projected revenues - which are based on state appropriations and funding collected through tuition and fees (operating fund). Figures for the operating fund are developed through enrollment projections that estimate the total number of students that will attend and total number of credits that will be taught.



The largest portion of the College's net position are its capital assets - which include its land, buildings, and equipment. But the College also invests much of its savings in stocks and bonds. Over the past three years, these investments have seen noticeable growth.
